**What is a University?** According to Wikipedia, "The word *university* is derived from the Latin *universitas magistrorum et scholarium*, which roughly means community of teachers and scholars. By 19th century, the German and the French university models had arisen. The German, or *Humboldtian* model (after Friedrich Humboldt) that was adopted by Harvard and then by other US institutions, was conceived by Wilhelm von Humboldt and is based on liberal ideas pertaining to the importance of freedom, seminars, and laboratories in universities. The French university model involved strict discipline and control over every aspect of the university." Friedrich's younger brother, Alexander von Humboldt, was equally famous, as a naturalist and scientist, and the Humboldt fellowship (recall last week's message) is named after him. Since the university is a community of teachers and scholars, teaching would seem to be one of the primary functions of the university. However, a 1995 article in Change Magazine titled "From Teaching to Learning" by Barr & Tagg, makes the point that for undergraduate education, shifting the emphasis from teaching to learning may be required. The article is a precursor for recent emphasis on output measures.
