### THE ACTING PROVOST'S WEEKLY BRIEF

#### **February 1, 2017**

The spring semester promises to be a time of challenges and, hopefully, opportunities as well. The challenges are many, including uncertainty regarding initiatives coming from the Trump Administration, budget issues, legislative expectations, campus climate, and others. It is going to take a great deal of cooperation and mutual communication to address these items.

As I write this report, university officials are assessing and monitoring the implications of President Trump's executive order banning nationals of seven Muslim-majority countries from entering the United States for at least the next 90 days. The order bars all people coming from Iraq, Syria, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan and Yemen.

For now, here are some of the communications and items regarding this issue: Acting President Abdallah released a <u>statement</u> regarding the executive order on Monday. For interested faculty, a new website related to the immigration ban is hosting a <u>petition</u> for "Academics Against [the] Immigration Executive Order." Finally, the following email from the <u>Global Education Office</u> went out to all identified affected students:

Dear International Students and Scholars.

You are receiving this message because you are from one of the countries effected by the Executive Order signed by President Trump on Friday, January 27, 2017 (Iran, Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria or Yemen). At this point in time, the order affects those who are trying to apply for U.S. visas and those visa holders trying to enter the US and does not currently include any direct mandate for those currently in the US who were lawfully admitted. We are following this situation closely and will provide additional information as it becomes available. However, for the time being you should not plan to travel outside of the US without consulting with an advisor in GEO. If you are receiving this message and you are not currently in the US, please contact me directly for further information and assistance.

We want to assure you that UNM and the GEO office are fully in support of our international students and scholars from all countries and we want you to feel welcome here. We appreciate how stressful and unnerving this situation is for everyone and we encourage you to reach out to our office and to Student Health and Counseling for support during this difficult time.

The McKinnon Center will serve an average of 2,900 students per semester. Of those, 2,400 are undergraduates (about 10% of the total undergraduate population on campus.
