Contrary to popular stereotypes, university leaders and faculty researchers across the country and at UNM are constantly thinking about how we can do our work better and help the public better understand the value of higher education. One way we do that is by understanding more deeply how the university experience impacts students' lives. Such studies have been going on for years, but often with very poor data, only tracking a non-representative group of students, or only those who stay in a particular state, or only tracking the narrowest of economic outcomes. All these fall short of what we need. Two new approaches hold great promise to help UNM and other universities improve our work with students. A new study out of the University of California will use 'big data' techniques to study the full breadth of the student experience in a highly diverse public research university: what students actually experience, how it impacts their learning, and what matters to their success. And a pilot project out of the U.S. Census Bureau (focused on our neighbors to the east) provides the richest data and the best study yet of student income and debt for years after they graduate. UNM is very much part of the movement to use emerging data analytic techniques to improve higher education, nationally and here at home. Let's all commit to always getting better at what we do for our students and New Mexico.

New UNM Degrees: Ph.D. and M.A. in Chicano/a Studies:

We are proud to announce the final step in the approval process for new Ph.D. and M.A. degrees in Chicano/a Studies at UNM. Update on that front: We have already hired three outstanding Native American scholars as part of this initiative, and expect to soon announce several more. This can be a transformative initiative for the university, one dimension of becoming "the University for New Mexico."
