The accreditation site visit with the Higher Learning Commission wrapped up on Tuesday, after both the Friday visits to Gallup and Taos, and the main campus visit on Monday and Tuesday. While the official results are several weeks off, all reports indicate a positive review. The site visit team expressed their appreciation for the quality of the materials prepared for them, the prompt response from campus to the many data requests, and the polished coordination of the on-site review. Thank you and kudos to everyone whose hard work and dedication contributed to a successful visit.

The site visit team will draft its report within the next four to six weeks. At that time we will have an opportunity to review their report and recommendations for errors of fact before that report is submitted to the Higher Learning Commission. The final team report and our institutional response, if we choose to submit one, are then sent to the HLC's Institutional Actions Council for review and action.
