As always, life is busy in Academic Affairs—as in units around the University. The recently completed legislative session provides new money for a number of UNM programs, and sufficient funding for an approximately 2% compensation increase on main campus (currently under discussion, and pending signature or veto by Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham). The Legislature also provided additional new money for the University budget, but not enough to fully backfill the state cuts and enrollment drops of recent years and other urgent funding needs. The Budget Leadership Team will soon finalize a proposal for how to combine new funding, reserves, and rescissions to units to produce a viable budget for next year; that will go to the President and ultimately to the upcoming Budget Summit with the Board of Regents.

Executive Search Status

Searches for the Provost and EVP for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Equity & Inclusion, Senior Vice President for Finance & Administration, and President & CEO of the UNM Foundation are all advancing. Two finalists for provost have been announced, with visits to campus next week. James Paul Holloway will be on campus Monday and Tuesday (March 25-26), with three forums on Monday in SUB Ballroom A: the faculty forum from 9-9:50 a.m., staff forum from 10-10:50 a.m., and open forum from 3-3:50 p.m. The second finalist, Michael J. Benedik, will be visiting on Thursday and Friday (March 28-29), with three forums on Thursday in SUB Lobo A & B: a faculty forum from 9-9:50 a.m., a staff forum from 10-10:50 a.m., and an open forum from 3-3:50 p.m. I encourage you to participate and provide feedback via a survey that will be available on the search webpage within 72 hours after each candidate's visit.

United Academics of UNM

Regarding the petition filed by <u>United Academics at UNM</u> (UA-UNM), all related documents—including the petition, UNM's "employers response," and my initial message regarding unionization—are now available online at the <u>president's website</u>. The legal documents are by definition very legally-framed and

should be read with that understanding. In the forums mentioned in my previous communique, UNM leadership hopes to have a thoughtful conversation with faculty, including those involved in the UA-UNM petition, about what faculty unionization would look like and the implications of any particular approach to unionization. My view: a useful dialogue will require a thoughtful approach and creative solution-finding on all sides. More to come.

The Federal Budget Process

The Trump administration revealed their \$4.7 trillion budget request early last week. While many of you have voiced concerns about what you are seeing and the impacts it could have on your research funding and other programs, I want to clarify that this proposal will likely not go much further. The release of the President's budget begins the actual development of a federal budget for the fiscal year that begins October 1. It's more likely Congress will build their own budget. It will now be up to the many committees of the Congress to turn proposals into legislative language, and eventually law.
