I recently wrote here about how UNM has <u>dramatically improved</u> the 4-year graduation rate of first-year full-time students. That rate is now ten percentage points *above* what would be predicted based on the entering class profile. Now, new data that will be shown at the April 9 Budget Summit shows what UNM's focus on student success means in the financial lives of our students and their families. Early glimpse: entering full-time first-year students now graduate on average almost a year earlier than a decade ago. Graduating a year early means they and their families save over \$8,000 in direct costs (over \$7,000 in tuition and \$1,000 in books and supplies) plus over \$40,000 in average additional wages they can make by graduating a year early (rough estimate of college graduate wages by *U.S. News & World Report*).

Students have many things to consider as they find a pathway that works for them: Family commitments, the need to work, health status, and prior academic preparation all affect choices about time-to-degree. By giving students greater clarity and momentum toward graduation, our focus on student success and delivering the quality education possible in a research setting helps *all* students graduate sooner, save money, and attain their dreams. Your work makes a difference in our students' lives.
