Provost Administrative Report

James Holloway, Provost & Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs

Update set of killings in Albuquerque and the impact on campus:

Today at 2:00pm, via Zoom, Chief Joe Silva and other UNM administration will conduct a UNM community forum to provide updates on where things stand and to hear questions and concerns. This will be an opportunity for us to learn the concerns of our faculty, staff, and students to see where we can address those concerns. The UNM PD is working closely with the Albuquerque PD and the FBI. We are as informed as we can be in the midst of an ongoing investigation. The Governor has also tasked State Police to work with APD in addressing the situation as well. UNM and APD are doing extra patrols. UNM Police are patrolling South to Gibson as some of these murders have occurred south of campus.

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The City is prioritizing safety officers in the Muslim community. These are social workers who can work within the communities to provide support and information. The City is starting a meal delivery service for people in the community that are concerned about going out, particularly at night.

On campus, we want to emphasize and reeducate our own community about some of the tools we have on campus. Including the service, we have to provide escorts from one end of campus to the other. We are surprised that there has not been an increase in requests for the escort service over the past week and think that people may have forgotten about that service. We would like to remind our UNM community to download and use the guardian app which provides on-campus and off campus safety tools. We have done a fair amount of safety messaging this past week and will continue to do so. We want to remind people of the blue light phones on campus that go straight to the UNM PD. We are hearing from impacted students about academic adjustments. We are working on a plan to accommodate that. More may be said this afternoon on that.

<u>Associate Provost Cheek</u>: We are creating messaging to both faculty and student to make them aware that there are adjustments that can be made, prioritizing evening courses.

<u>Provost Holloway</u>: Our primary approach to this is going to be a case by case basis. We are also looking at the impacts on staff and faculty and hope to hear more at the forum today.

Faculty & Faculty Actions:

- UNM has 145 new faculty-95 in health sciences and 50 outside health. This is inclusive of HSC, central and branch campuses. I am very proud to report that number across all our campuses. We are getting better at inclusivity within the campuses as we are one university.
 - o Half of the new faculty are persons of color and over half are female
- We completed 118 faculty promotions
- New Leadership:
 - Chancellors: Mike Holtzclaw is the new Chancellor at UNM Los Alamos, and Sam Dosumu is the new Chancellor at UNM Valencia
 - o Eric Scott is the New VP for Student Affairs

Research Metrics

- We are experiencing 5-year highs
- Total expenditures through Office of Sponsored Projects (OSP) is up 16%
- Seeing a lot of growth in the research enterprise: 11% increase in awards through OSP and a 12% increase in awards at HSC

EPSCoR (Established Program to Stimulate Competitive Research)

- This is a national science foundation program targeted at certain regions of the country to increase research productivity in those regions.
- New leadership for the New Mexico EPSCoR consortium is UNM Professor Ganesh Balakrishnan

Grand Challenges

- This was initiated in 2018 by President Stokes.
- Original focus: Sustainable Water Resources, Substance Use Disorders, and Successful Aging
- We have seen significant leverage in funding for this initiative.
 - o Substance Use Disorders bringing in a \$10M grant
 - Sustainable water resources part of a \$15M grant
 - o Greater than \$50M related external grant funding
- Ellen Fisher has designed a 3-phase process for keeping the grand challenges moving forward

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- O Phase I: Creation of concept teams Summer 2022
 - Just announced 10 new concept teams: Space Science, Housing Justice, Child Health, Culturally Responsive Literacy, Equity in STEM Education, Just Transitions (Energy), Basic Needs in Higher Ed, Mental Health & Suicide prevention, Indigenous Child Development milestones, and Data Science education and Data Literacy
- Phase II: Selection of new Grand Challenge teams Spring 2023
- Phase III: Next Steps/Leveling up 2025 and beyond

Student Success/Student development

- SEP (Student Experience Project) is a national project to establish evidence-based learning conditions promoting academic engagement and equity. UNM received a 3-yr \$300,000 grant from the APLU and Raikes Foundation in 2019 and has now institutionalized the project
 - o 10.5% increase in positive student experience reported by students
 - 25% increase in positive student experience among Black, Latina, and Native American women experiencing high financial stress
 - o In Fall of 2021, 2% decrease in fail and withdrawal rates and 10% increase in As and Bs in course sections where SEP was used.
 - 92% of students in SEP STEM classes were retained in STEM pipeline from Fall 2021 to Spring 2022
- PLF (Peer Learning Facilitators) Program Peer Learning Facilitators are undergraduate students
 who are invited and trained to join instructional teams in courses where they have previously been
 successful; they facilitate active learning and serve as near-peer mentors who normalize life and
 course challenges.
 - Students from rural or low-income backgrounds interacted with PLFs more than their highincome urban peers
 - PLF support was critical to course success according to 87% of students in PLF-supported classes and 95% of American Indian students.
 - o 91% of PLFs report that they became more confident as leaders; 16% of these PLFs are American Indian students.
- ECURE (Expanding Course-based Undergraduate Research) A 5-year NSF Grant. Supports faculty members in incorporating undergraduate research and active project-based learning into general education and other entry-level courses.
 - o 52% of ECURE students were more likely to return to UNM in the semester following an ECURE class when compared to student who had not taken an ECURE class.
 - o ECURE students were more likely to persist in STEM degrees
- LoboGROW A brand new program developed by Dr. Cheek, designed to make on campus student employment for undergraduates much more developmental and educational than it currently is.
 <u>Associate Provost Cheek</u>: I would like to give credit to Cindy Pierard with the library, Liz Amador with Associate Director of Financial aid, and Jenna Crabb, Director of Career Services. I just started the conversation and these individuals have been key in starting this initiative.
- Retention Data: Retention rate for the Fall 2020-2021 cohort is +2.84. It is not up to where we want it to be, nor is it up to where we were right up to the pandemic. We know the pandemic had a real

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negative impact on retention and we are starting to reverse that. The message I want to send is that we are starting to recover and reverse some of our retention challenges we've seen since the pandemic and we have a way to go. Retention percentage prior to pandemic was 77%.

<u>Regent & Chair Rael</u>: Before we proceed to the informational items, I would like to move the member and advisor comments to the end for the informational items so that everyone has the opportunity to hear all the updates.

I would also like to acknowledge that we have an honorary Co-Chair today, Regent Robert Schwartz. One of the important topics we will hear about today is mental health and wellness support for UNM students. There is some overlap with the SSTAR committee and the HSC committee which Regent Schwartz Chairs. Really, we are one Board of Regents and it doesn't matter what committee a topic falls under. We are all here to do what is best for our students and the community. Thank you for your work Regent Schwartz on this topic of mental health.

<u>Regent & Co-Chair Schwartz:</u> Thank you for having me here today. I appreciate the SSTAR committee taking on this issue and pursuing it with such vigor. I have been pleased wit the way the University has been developing the mental health and wellness program to support UNM students.

A. Mental Health and Wellness Support for UNM Students: an Integrated Approach

Assata Zerai, Ph.D., Vice President for Equity and Inclusion

Stephanie McIver, Ph.D., Interim Executive Director, Student Health and Counseling

<u>A.Zerai, PhD</u>: Introduced Dr. McIver. The goal for today's presentation is to report on our progress. Dr. McIver has been working on this for about 3 years, pulling everyone together and creating this integrated approach. Covid has had a huge impact on all of this. We have worked on this over the summer and want to provide an update on our progress in terms of strengthening UNM's delivery for mental health services to our students. Our goals today are to report on our progress.

- decreasing wait times at Student Health and Counseling (SHAC)
- providing greater support to students with substance use disorder, Dr. Tohen, in Psychiatry has contributed greatly to that effort
- designing an integrated approach across healthcare, student affairs, academic affairs, and other relevant units

In an effort to prepare for the semester, we are calling this the acute phase of this plan, which consists of:

- ramping up provider access-Kathy Agnew in HR has been especially helpful in this endeavor.
 - We have requests and received approval for 7 new positions at SHAC. The hires are in process.
- Integrated approach: making visible the bridges Dr. McIver has built across direct service and support units: UNM HSC School of Medicine, Dept of Psychiatry, and Behavioral Sciences. They provide specialty and subspecialty services including psychiatric emergency services, inpatient care, and outpatient services for substance use disorder. We are rolling all of this into one package and hope to publicize on SHAC's website, the new mental health website at

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<u>https://mentalhealth.unm.edu/</u>. When students have an issue or faculty, or staff want to support a student that has an issue they can use the website as a way finder for mental health.

<u>S. McIver, PhD</u>: The effort is a convergence of a lot of bodies with an interest in mental health care on campus. In terms of college students and their mental health, Healthy minds network, which functions out of the University of Michigan and is associated with the Jed foundation collected data from a number of campuses.

- In 2020–21, >60% of students met criteria for one or more mental health diagnosis
- Mental health worsened, by self-report
- American Indian//Indigenous students have a significant increase in suicidal ideation
- All students of color groups across all campuses still present to services less than the rate of white students.

Here on our campuses, we have a CARE team which functions out of the Dean of Students office. It is a multidisciplinary team across specialties, and it receives reports from faculty, staff, students, and even some parents about students in distress. The CARE team would lay eyes and evaluate what is the best approach for the student. The CARE team saw 200+ students last Fall between the start of term and the middle of October. The key issue is stress and coping with difficulty. Secondarily are roommate issues. We are being thoughtful in our approach as to how we can imbed mental health care in housing and residential life. This is where the majority of our cases originate.

After hours with students in distress is our main issue on this campus.

There is a new metric to determine how many clinical staff members are needed on campus. We know you can't hire your way out of a mental health crisis issue. We are trying to determine how many counselors we need to provide the type of service for the number of students that come through our doors. This metric is the clinical load index. We can develop a score to determine where we stand in comparison to our colleagues. Based on the metrics, the plan for hiring as recommended by the SHAC-Health System task force will include (per FTE): 1.0 Psychologist, .50 Law School, 2.0 Counseling positions with .50 embedded in African American Student services, 1.0 Counselor embedded in student housing, 1.0 training and development specialist/social worker, 2.5 administrative support, and 1.0 for a business analyst.

- New counselors (positions posted in July) will be hired by start of the semester. They will begin to engage with residence life, student services units, and the campus community more broadly by September.
- And the newly hired counselors should all be credentialed by October 2022, the time in the semester during which wait times from triage to assessment, typically begin to increase.
- We will have a new psychologist beginning in August.
- We expect that our new Mental Health Training and Development Specialist will begin by start of the semester (interviews taking place week of August 1st).
- Further, crucial staff positions are expected to be filled by start of the semester (Admin 3 and Business Analyst).
- The UNM campus mental health team and direct services units (DSU) team will begin to meet monthly once again.
- We will have set benchmarks for improvement in services and increased student usage of those services due to increased staffing, and we will track those.

Work will continue on an integrated approach to student mental health across Albuquerque, Branch campuses, Heath Sciences, and Athletics.

B. Student Health and Counseling (SHAC) Fees and Revenues *James P. Holloway, Ph.D., Provost & EVP for Academic Affairs*

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What we are thinking about is how we are going to pay for this effort. I wanted to provide some information about the funding of these efforts. This is focused on SHAC revenues where a large amount of this work is residing. The goal is to provide an update on what the finances in SHAC look like and describe what are possible sources of revenue to pay for these important services. It will be the work of the President's leadership team with input from others to figure out what paths are we pursuing to address this. Prior to the current work on funding these 7.5 positions, there was a shortfall in SHAC legend. This year we are filling in about \$500K this year using a combination of leftover HEERF funds and reserves. SHAC's main source of funds is student fees. Approximately a year ago, we went to a per headcount model. Each student is charged a certain amount and that money goes directly to SHAC. Fiscal year 22 is the first year that is reflected. Based on the attached graph there is a drop in student fees. This is due to Covid. The university took a cut, enrollments were down, there was a large drop in SHAC student fee revenue. We utilized HEERF money to fill in that gap. We also receive monies from billing insurance companies and service costs collected, i.e. co-pays. Overtime we have systematically added I&G funds. Revenue is also received from sales, i.e. pharmacy.

Students currently pay \$107.00 per term, if they are taking 4 credit hours or more and \$72 in the summer. Units that do not participate in SHAC, particularly the branch campuses, students can choose to pay that fee and receive services through SHAC.

The analysis shows that if we were to raise the fees to \$128 per term and \$85 in summer, that would generate the money to cover the additional mental health services. Total recurring need in SHAC is ~\$1.3M. We are currently fine. We do need to think long term. We can increase net clinical revenue, increase number of patients, find ways to build better (work with insurance companies to pay for treatments), increase sales (SHAC looking into a possible Optical shop). There is also a consideration of a legislative ask around mental health support. We don't know what that looks like, but it is an idea. These are the ideas we are looking at. Some of these may naturally occur as we are back in-person and fees may naturally go up. Increasing the student fees would be covered by opportunity scholarship.

C. Enrollment Update

TAB D

Dan Garcia, Vice Provost for Enrollment Management

Jose Villar, Director Student Services

<u>Dan Garcia:</u> At our last meeting we talked about the development of a comprehensive strategic enrollment recruiting plan. We undertook this effort in 2019 and we finalized it, operationalized it, and it is ongoing work. It takes into consideration the university strategic plan; the mission and values of the institution and it reflects work across campus and beyond enrollment management.

<u>Provost Holloway:</u> The State started requiring us to submit a formal enrollment plan to them. We have done this for all of our campuses, and they have all been approved by the state.

<u>Dan Garcia:</u> This year, overall, our first-year applications were down, more substantially for non-residents than residents. However, we have made more offers to first-year students than we had in the previous year. These offers are critical and are often accompanied by a scholarship offer or a financial aid offer. Additionally, it is important to note that we have made more offers to African American, Hispanic, and American Indian students. Over the years we have modified the criteria for scholarships allowing more opportunity for first generation, low income, rural, and students of color. Scholarships are vitally important. The opportunity scholarship is this middle dollar, meaning that you can use both the lottery and opportunity to cover tuition and fees. It means that you can use your Pell grant and institutional scholarship for housing, meal plans, books, and other living expenses.

We are very optimistic when we look the increase in applications this year. Transfer student applications are up. We have more transfer students signed up for new student orientation than at any point going back to 2015. The same holds true for first time students. It looks to be a very good year for new students coming to UNM. Over the last 2 years we have seen a 19% to 20% increase in Graduate enrollments. That trend dropped a bit back in the Spring, we are back to where we have been the last couple of years.

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Jose Villar: New students as well as their parents are introduced to SHAC as well as all the other services available to them during orientation. Students that have been away from the university for 3 semesters are expected to complete an online orientation. They are re-introduced to the services available at the university. We've offered 11 first year orientations, 11 family connection orientations, 7 transfer orientations, and some "NSO to Go" which are virtual orientations for students' safety as well. Out of state students must complete the online orientation before they can register for classes. Based on the numbers we are seeing at orientation we are expecting an incoming class of approximately 3400

For the incoming first year class, 46.97% identify as first-generation for college. UNM was just designated as a first-generation forward institution by NASPA, the National Association of Student Professionals. This is a tribute to the recruiting efforts and shows that we are closing the gap on access to education for those underrepresented families.

Member Comments:

<u>Provost Holloway:</u> I would like to say thank you to Dan and his team, Jose, and his team. They have done some amazing work. When you see, over the last couple years, universities across the country have seen significant drops in enrollments and we are seeing growth with numbers higher than we've seen since 2016, 2017 is really remarkable.

<u>Regent & Chair Rael</u>: At a future meeting, I would like to see a deeper dive into where we see graduate enrollment going and what we are doing about the decline.

<u>Provost Holloway:</u> One of the things we are starting to do with graduate student enrollment is taking an enrollment management approach. Graduate student admission and enrollment is usually a very distributive. Departments and units do their own graduate admissions and recruiting. We are starting by looking at the pipeline. We don't usually monitor the same retention data that we do for undergraduates. We are starting to do that. We are working on this.

<u>Student Regent Ko:</u> Does the first-year convocation include transfer and graduate students? If it doesn't, could we increase sense of belonging by including them?

<u>Jose Villar</u>: It is not inclusive of transfer students; however, all of the events are advertised to transfer students. The office of advisement strategies recently hired a transfer coordinator. We are hosting a transfer week. We roll out the red carpet for our students. It is our transfer students that are our livelihood. We are going to do a much better job as a university and work with our branch campuses to make sure they have that support.

<u>Provost Holloway</u>: I would like to clarify what a transfer student is. These are students that could be simultaneously enrolled at a branch campus, CNM, and main campus, students that will go to CNM for a term, UNM for a term, and Hobbs for a term. I call them multi-institution students. There is this group of students that do not identify with a particular university in the traditional way of thinking. I appreciate the concern for how we build identity and community for those students. We are working on way to support the multi-institution student.

Advisor Comments:

<u>ASUNM President May</u>: I am excited for all of the strides we talked about today. I would like to highlight the importance of having student voices in these rooms. Thank you, Dr. McIver, for inviting ASUNM to be involved. I would also like us to explore other ways of funding the mental health initiative before we raise the fee that students pay.

The UNM Center for Development and Disability

- The UNM Center for Development and Disability has served as New Mexico's federally designated University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities Education, Research and Service (UCEDD) since 1990.
- UCEDDS work to accomplish a shared vision that foresees a nation in which all people, including those with disabilities, participate fully in their communities. As the NM UCEDD, the CDD is charged to pursue the same mission more locally on behalf of all New Mexicans.
- The CDD does this by working directly with people with (and at risk for) disabilities; members of their families; federal, state and local government agencies; university partners; community providers and other collaborators/stakeholders to develop and deliver diverse programs/projects.
- These projects are diverse and encompass clinical and community training, technical assistance/consultation, direct services, research and information sharing across the disability, early childhood and prevention space in NM.

Dr. McClain Endowment

- This proposed Endowment fund would be established to support the salary and benefits for the faculty Director/Division Chief appointed to lead the UNM Center for Development and Disability through the Department of Pediatrics and School of Medicine.
- Annual endowment revenue will be used to support a portion of FTE/salary and commensurate percentage cost for benefits for the appointed CDD Director.
- Establishing an Endowment fund for the CDD Directorship would establish a reliable funding stream to support needed FTE for the clinical, administrative and leadership expertise required for this position. In addition, it will enhance national recruitment efforts over time.

Dr. Cate McClain

- Dr. Catherine "Cate" McClain was a Developmental Pediatrician, Professor in Pediatrics and Director of the Center for Development and Disability (CDD) at the University of New Mexico for more than 20 years before her retirement in 2014.
- Prior to becoming a physician, Dr. McClain was trained and practiced as a pediatric physical therapist, focusing on motor and sensory issues in young children. Her
 clinical expertise in the area of Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) led her to develop the state's first Autism Diagnostic Clinic at the CDD and ultimately to secure
 state funding for the CDD's Autism Programs serving children, youth and adults with ASD statewide and providing consultation and training for practitioners.
- She is one of just two Developmental and Behavioral Pediatricians in our state and worked extensively during her career as part of interdisciplinary teams diagnosing various developmental disabilities, including ASD in children and youth birth to 22 from throughout New Mexico.
- After the CDD was established as the NM University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities (UCEDD) in 1990, Dr. McClain took over the Directorship a role she held for over 20 years. During her tenure, she was integral to the success of the CDD in securing funded projects serving those in our state with and at risk for developmental and other disabilities.
- During the course of her career, she was the recipient of numerous awards, including the Leonard Nepolitano, PhD award from the UNM School of Medicine Alumni Association in 2013, the A+ Award for Community Service from the Albuquerque Mayor's office (2008), the Friends of Occupational Therapy (OT) Award from the UNM OT program (2007), and the Toby Long Award for Best Article in Pediatric Physical Therapy (2005). In 2000 she was selected for the prestigious Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr Public Policy Fellow in 2000, spending a year in Washington, DC and brining this experience back to her work in NM.
- Dr. McClain was a respected leader across the UCEDD National Network, and a valued leader within the UNM School of Medicine and Department of Pediatrics where she additionally served as the Division Chief and Medical Director for the CDD. In addition, she served as the Director of the NM Leadership in Neurodevelopmental Disorders (NM LEND) program.
- Dr. McClain's contributions to the success of the CDD and her unwavering commitment serving to New Mexicans living with and at risk for developmental and other disabilities UNM SOM and beyond are unequivocal.

Dr. Moriarta is a Professor, child/family clinical psychologist and Division Chief for the Child Development Division since 2014. She holds a secondary appointment in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. She is also the Executive and Medical Director of the UNM Center for Development and Disability, and continues to serve as the CDD's Division Director for the Early Childhood Home and Family Service Division since 2012.



In 2003 she came to the UNM School of Medicine after completing her internship, residency and serving as a faculty psychologist at the University of Southern California Keck School of Medicine Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities housed at Children's Hospital Los Angeles (CHLA). During her tenure at CHLA, she developed expertise in infant/early childhood development, early childhood mental health, two-generation approaches to intervention, neurodevelopmental disorders, developmental disabilities, systems change and leadership development.



Dr. Moriarta serves as part of the Departmental Promotion and Tenure Committee, the HSC Behavioral Health Integration Committee, the Integrating Special Populations in Research Committee, and the HSC Psychology Leadership Committee. She is also a senior teacher/clinical supervisor for the UNM HSC American Psychological Association accredited Psychology Internship Training Program and has developed and taught multiple evidence-based trainings and seminars for community-based behavioral health providers. Dr. Moriarta has also been an integral force in creating innovative partnerships between the UNM CDD Autism Programs and UNM Children's Hospital and Children's Psychiatric Hospital that have served to improve care for children and youth with Autism Spectrum Disorder and other neurodevelopmental disorders and often challenging behaviors.



The UNM CDD is one of 67 UCEDDs and is one of the larger UCEDDs nationally with approximately \$20 million in funded contracts, grants and fee-for service projects supporting those with and at risk for developmental delays, disabilities and mental health/behavioral disorders. The UNM CDD and NM LEND are part of the larger national Developmental Disabilities (DD) Network and many projects at the CDD have a statewide scope. Dr. Moriarta is regarded as a leader within the DD network and among her peer group of UCEDD Directors across the country; she is also a highly regarded leader within the University and state.



Dr. Moriarta is one of those rare leaders who is also a team player – she is committed to the work of the institution and brings her content and clinical knowledge, commitment to mission and commitment to underserved populations to all she does.

On behalf of the UNM School of Medicine and the Department of Pediatrics, we request approval to appoint Marcia Moriarta, PsyD, IMH-E(4) as the holder of the Catherine McClain Endowed Chair in Human Development and Disability. We are concurrently requesting creation and approval of the quasi-endowed chair and appointment by the Board of Regents according to Regents Policy 2.11 and University Business Policy 1020. This is the inaugural appointment.

Dr. Catherine "Cate" McClain was a Developmental Pediatrician, Professor in Pediatrics and Director of the Center for Development and Disability (CDD) at the University of New Mexico for more than 20 years. Her clinical expertise in the area of Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) led her to develop the state's first Autism Diagnostic Clinic at the CDD and ultimately to secure state funding for the CDD's Autism Programs serving children, youth and adults with ASD statewide and providing consultation and training for practitioners. During her career, she was the recipient of numerous awards, including the Leonard Napolitano, PhD, award from the UNM School of Medicine Alumni Association in 2013, the A+ Award for Community Service from the Albuquerque Mayor's office (2008), the Friends of Occupational Therapy (OT) Award from the UNM OT program (2007), and the Toby Long Award for Best Article in Pediatric Physical Therapy (2005). In 2000 she was selected for the prestigious Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr Public Policy Fellow in 2000, spending a year in Washington, DC, and bringing this experience back to her work in New Mexico. Dr. McClain was a respected leader across the UCEDD National Network, and a valued leader within the UNM School of Medicine and Department of Pediatrics. Dr. McClain's contributions to the success of the CDD and her unwavering commitment serving New Mexicans living with and at risk for developmental and other disabilities, UNM SOM, and beyond are unequivocal. An endowed chair in her honor is a testament to her indelible impact on UNM and New Mexico.

support the salary and benefits for the faculty

Director/Division Chief appointed to lead the UNM Center for Development and Disability through the Department of Pediatrics and School of Medicine. Annual endowment revenue will be used to support a portion of FTE/salary and commensurate percentage cost for benefits for the appointed CDD Director. The CDD Director also serves as the Division Chief for the Division of Child Development within the

Department of Pediatrics.

Currently, FTE and benefits for this position are supported primarily through grant and contract funding associated with specific project goals aligned with federally established Center "core functions". Establishing an Endowment fund for the CDD Directorship would establish a reliable funding stream to support needed FTE for the clinical, administrative and leadership expertise required for this position. In addition, it will enhance national recruitment efforts over time.

The CDD is prepared to contribute \$1,500,000 to establish this

endowed chair to support the CDD Directorship.



The UNM Center for Development and Disability has served as New Mexico's federally designated University Center for **Excellence in Developmental Disabilities Education, Research** and Service (UCEDD) since 1990. The Center is part of a larger national network of 67 UCEDDs, with at least one UCEDD in every state and territory. Collectively, UCEDDS work to accomplish a shared vision that foresees a nation in which all people, including those with disabilities, participate fully in their communities. As the NM UCEDD, the CDD is charged to pursue the same mission more locally on behalf of all New Mexicans. The CDD does so by working directly with people with (and at risk for) disabilities; members of their families; federal, state and local government agencies; university partners; community providers and other collaborators/stakeholders to develop and deliver diverse programs/projects. These projects are diverse and encompass clinical and community training, technical assistance/consultation, direct services, research and information sharing across the disability, early childhood and prevention space in NM. The CDD, like all UCEDDs, receives core Center funding authorized under Public Law 106-402 (The Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000, or, "DD Act") administered by the Office of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities housed within the Administration on Community Living. In 2020-21, the UNM CDD was in the top third of all UCEDDs in terms of funded projects and diverse programming. In addition, the CDD provided community training related to Autism Spectrum Disorder and other developmental disabilities to more than 8000 individuals across the state. The Center's direct service programs delivered prevention, early intervention, case management and clinical services to over 2000 families. This included children/individuals who are medically fragile and living at home; children/youth with Autism Spectrum Disorder; adults with disabilities; children and families impacted by substance use and prenatal exposure to substances; and families during pregnancy and early childhood at high risk for poor outcomes due toxic stress and traumatic experiences. This is just a snapshot of what the CDD contributes to the NM community, and how we support the central mission of the University, School of Medicine and larger Health System. An endowed Directorship/Division Chief will increase the Center's national recognition, communicate the University's commitment to those with disabilities in our state in a very overt and public way, create an even stronger platform for the Center to continue to serve, and will enhance our efforts to obtain future federal grants bringing more needed resource to our state. This endowed position will create a stable funding source allowing time for



the Director to devote to strategic planning and enhance the Center's visibility across the state and nationally, allowing the Center to even better meet our internal and University missions on behalf of those with and at risk for disability across our state over time.

I am grateful for having had the opportunity to write this letter since I feel a sense of deep appreciation for having had the opportunity to be mentored by such a skilled and considerate mentor, such as Dr. Moriarta.

I have known Dr. Moriarta since 2007 when I became a doctoral graduate trainee at the UNM Center for Development and Disability. It gives me great pleasure to write this letter on behalf of Dr. Garth Olson to receive the first Fred S. Herzon Endowed Professorship. Dr. Olson is a Professor in the Department of Surgery, Division of Otolaryngology, at the University of New Mexico.

A one-resident –per-year program it was expanded to 2 residents every other year in 2013 under Dr. Olson as program director and is now planning expansion next year to 2 residents per year or a total of 12 residents. Since 1973 the division of otolaryngology has grown from 2 faculty members to now 14 faculty at UNM and is planning on transitioning to a department of Otolaryngology in the next two years. Although Dr. Herzon is no longer clinically active, he continues to plan an important mentorship role for residents and faculty at UNM.

Dr. Garth Olson was born and raised in Albuquerque. After graduating from high school in Albuquerque, he attended the University of Arizona where he received his B.S. in biochemistry in 1991 and his MD from the University of Arizona SOM in 1995. Dr. Olson completed his



Surgery Internship and Residency in Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery at St Louis University School of Medicine from 1995 to 2000. After finishing his training in Missouri, Dr. Olson then went on to his Fellowship in Head and Neck Surgery and Microvascular Reconstruction at Vanderbilt University which he completed in 2001. That same year Dr. Olson was recruited to the University of New Mexico by then Otolaryngology Division Chief Dr. Fred S. Herzon. Dr. Olson received and holds his board certification from the American Board of Otolaryngology in 2001 and from the Council for Advanced Training in Oncologic Head and Neck surgery.

Dr. Olson arrived to UNM as a highly trained surgical specialist and rapidly displayed his versatility and raised the clinical bar in head and neck surgery and reconstruction, skull base surgery, voice and laryngeal surgery. He made significant contributions in comprehensive otolaryngology, including maxillofacial trauma, serving both at the University of New Mexico and VA hospitals. Dr. Olson has particular interest and expertise in parathyroid disorders. During his over 20 years of service at UNM, he has pioneered new techniques and brought resources to the people of New Mexico to treat parathyroid gland problems. He is an active member of American Thyroid Association, American Association of Clinical Endocrinologists, American Academy of Otolaryngology - Head and Neck Surgery. Dr. Olson continues to be very busy clinically performing approximately 200 thyroid/parathyroid surgeries per year and as a member of the anterior skull base multidisciplinary surgery team performs 50 anterior skull bases cases per year.

As a native New Mexican, Dr. Olson embodies much of our mission at the School of Medicine. He values the opportunity to provide world-class care through the UNM Health System and Cancer Center and believes that excellent care starts with listening to his patients, speaking to them in their native Spanish language, and working as a team with other practitioners. These partners and colleagues strongly recommend Dr. Olson and have submitted letters in support of his appointment as the Dr. Fred S. Herzon Professor.

During his over 20 years at UNM, Dr. Olson has served in many roles including the Otolaryngology Program Director for 15 years, member of the Robotic Steering Committee, member and director of the Surgical Services Operations Committee and most recently as the Executive Surgical Director of Surgical Services for UNM. His ability to work and thoughtfully communicate with multiple faculty and staff across departments made him the obvious choice for this Executive Director leadership role.



Furthermore, Dr. Olson has been recognized as national leader in the field of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery. In addition to his membership in multiple Professional Societies he has published 20 scholarly articles, and given over 40 presentations at regional and national professional meetings.

In summary, Dr. Olson is a Professor, Surgical Oncologist, and respected Otolaryngologist. He has over 20 years of experience at UNM as a clinician and educator, and a passion for medical education, mentorship, service and leadership. This endowed professorship honor carries an esteemed title but aligns so well with Dr. Olson's kindred spirit to Dr. Herzon, in his devotion and love for teaching our learners and his commitment to New Mexico.

I am absolutely thrilled to write this letter of support on behalf of Dr. Garth Olson who has been named as a candidate for the inaugural Fred S. Herzon Professorship. On a personal note, I have known Dr. Olson for almost twenty years – I first met him in my second year of medical school here at UNM. Personal Statement

<u>Clinical:</u> My clinical practice presently is split between thyroid/parathyroid surgery and anterior skull base surgery. About two years ago, we opened an interdisciplinary thyroid parathyroid clinic with a dedicated thyroid parathyroid endocrinologist, pathology and radiology incorporated on site. This patient centered clinic has improved access and care of both routine and difficult surgical endocrine problems. Presently I perform approximately 200 thyroid/parathyroid surgeries per year. Additionally I am a member of the anterior skull base surgery team. In this role, I participate in a multidisciplinary team with my neurosurgery colleagues, neuro-ophthalmology, endocrinology, radiology and pathology. Here two, we have established a single site interdisciplinary clinic to benefit patients in our region. I perform about 50 anterior skull base

cases per year. Finally, I still Maintain the presence in our multidisciplinary head neck cancer surgery practice. In this role, I serve as a mentor to our younger surgeons as well as operating on patients.

Academic: Within the realm of thyroid and parathyroid surgery, her recent research has focused on novel uses of artificial intelligence as it applies to thyroid pathology. We are also actively researching frailty scale applications and minimizing narcotic use postoperatively in thyroid and parathyroid surgery. In the skull base realm, We are applying Prouty skills to patient's preoperatively to aid in decision making as well as researching olfactory preservation for transsphenoidal surgeries.

Administration: After being the Otolaryngology Program Director for 15 years I have transitioned to a new role in hospital administration as the Executive Surgical Director of Surgical Services. NS role, I am in a triad with the Director of Anesthesia Services and the executive Director of the Operating Room. My role in this position is representing the interests of surgeons in our institution to the executive hospital leadership and formulating policies at our institutions that will benefit all operative services.

Mentoring: As a senior faculty member in my department, I have an active mentoring role principally with younger faculty. Through many formal mentoring relationships, I have had the opportunity to further the career goals of many of my peers.

They started by working in the Mathematics Department, but soon decided to launch a Computer Science program and formed a department within the School of Engineering in 1976. Cleve Moler, originally a Professor of Mathematics, joined the department in 1980 as its Chair.

Cleve used his time on campus to develop the first version of Matlab for his numerical methods class. He then ported it to the VAX and was able to send early versions to other educators on UNIX systems. Cleve furthered the reach of the Matlab program by creating an early PC version with support from IBM. What started as a teaching and research endeavor became a transformational breakthrough to support students, faculty, and researchers far beyond New Mexico.

Even after Cleve's departure from UNM, Matlab continues as an important part of the education both through courses in numerical methods and in the very first computer course taken by engineering students. On the research side, Matlab remains crucial to the large amounts of computational research on campus. UNM is proud that this valuable technology had its start in Albuquerque in concert with the formation of our Computer Science program. Of course, the common denominator is Cleve Moler.

Today the UNM Department of Computer Science, while relatively small, occupies a large footprint. This is attributed to an ethic in the program to allow faculty to pursue their academic passions with ample independence. The result is a highly interdisciplinary department that provides a diverse educational experience for its students and the greater UNM community. Faculty research and teaching interests include large scale computing with the Center for Advanced Research Computing, the UNM Art Research, Technology and Science Laboratory (ARTS Lab, the Interdisciplinary Film and Digital Media Program), Complexity Science with the Santa Fe Institute, Robotics, and Artificial Intelligence. - 1) As Trustee you are hereby given full power to invest and re-invest the principal of said trust fund, together with any excess income that may be obtained from the investment, as in your judgment may be deemed most advisable, with a view to obtaining an adequate income with reasonable assurance of security, for the educational purposes hereinafter specified. In the handling of said trust fund you, as trustee, are hereby permitted to make any investments permitted by law for trustees so acting under the laws governing national banking institutions and the laws of the State of New Mexico, and without regard to diversification, but shall not otherwise be held liable in the handling of such trust fund.
- It is specifically understood and agreed that in accepting the duties of Trustee hereunder for the establishment of the John Field Simms! Memorial Lectures you, and your successors agree that once a year you will pay over to the Regents of the University of New Mexico through J. R. Modrall and Pearce C. Rodey, designated as advisors hereunder, the net income from such trust fund (not to exceed \$1,000.00 per year) to be used by said Regents for the annual presentation of a lecture by a distinguished member of the legal profession. The choice of such lecturer shall be made upon the designation of J. R. Modrall, Pearce C. Rodey and the Dean of the College of Law, or a majority of them acting as an Advisory Board. In the event of the death or inability of J. R. Modrall or Pearce C. Rodey to act as advisors in conjunction with such selection, their successors shall be appointed and designated by the Regents of the University of New Mexico from outstanding memhers of the legal profession practicing in the City of Alhuquerque, New Mexico.

It is the hope of the undersigned, as donor, that the trust fund established hereunder will produce at least One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) a year from income, so as to provide an adequate honorarium for the purpose here-tofore specified, but in the event said income falls below that amount you as Trustee are hereby authorized to use part of the principal for the same purpose.

3) It is the intention of the undersigned donor that


